
October 2023

OSU Institute of Technology (OSUIT) completed the Higher Learning Commission's Academy for Student Persistence and Completion in May 2018 along with other institutions in the first cohort group. During this Academy, the OSUIT team decided to focus on retention and persistence of *full-time*, *first-time*, *degree-seeking freshmen*. With that in mind, this report continues to provide tables and visualizations of retention, persistence, and completion (graduation) rates for first-time, degree-seeking freshmen from fall 2010 to fall 2022.

Definitions for information found in this document are shown below:

- First-time means the student has less than 7 college-level hours attempted.
- Full-time counts include students enrolled in 12 or more credit hours.
- Part-time counts include students enrolled in 1 to 11 credit hours.
- Degree-seeking means the student must be pursuing a BT, AAS, or AS degree or are currently undecided on which degree to pursue at OSUIT. These students should complete the AAS or AS degree within six (6) trimesters. Since OSUIT's bachelor's degrees require an associate degree for admission, there should not be any new freshmen seeking a bachelor's degree.
- Retention is defined as enrolled for the fall trimester indicated and enrolled for the following fall trimester. Basically, the retention rate is the percentage of students still enrolled after one year.
- Persistence is defined as enrolled term to term. Persistence includes students enrolled
 for the fall trimester and continuously enrolled for the following trimester(s). Persistence
 does not include students who stop-out and return for a later term. Once a student
 stops-out, they are no longer part of the persistence cohort. Many Arts and Sciences
 programs, as well as the Nursing program, do not require students to be enrolled for the
 summer, so that needs to be considered when reviewing persistence rates.
- An academic year is comprised of the summer, fall, and spring trimesters. For example, academic year 2022-2023 includes the summer 2022, fall 2022, and spring 2023 trimesters.


The most recent retention rate for OSUIT is 63 percent for full-time, first-time, degree-seeking freshmen. According to the National Student Clearinghouse, the national average retention rate is 61 percent for public 2-year colleges (https://nscresearchcenter.org/persistence-retention/) while the average retention rate for Oklahoma 2-year colleges is 60 percent according to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (https://okhighered.org/wp-content/uploads/2023/07/2021-22-retention-rates-institution.pdf).



The three-year average retention rate for OSUIT full-time, first-time, degree-seeking freshmen is 64 percent, which is higher than the previous 3-year average of 62 percent. This means over half of our full-time, first-time, degree-seeking freshmen return for the fall trimester of their sophomore year. The three-year average persistence rate for the same cohort is 84 percent meaning over three-quarters of the fall cohort return for the following spring trimester.

Using data from National Center for Education Statistics Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS), the OSUIT graduation rate increased from 25 percent in 2012 to 42 percent in 2022. That is a 17 percent increase in 10 years. These rates are based on the full-time, first-time, degree-seeking cohorts for the fall 2006 and fall 2016 terms respectively. The 2022 national average graduation rate for 2-year colleges is 43%

(<u>https://nscresearchcenter.org/completing-college/?hilite=graduation+rates</u>) and the Oklahoma average is 25% (<u>https://okhighered.org/wp-content/uploads/2023/07/AY12-AY21-graduation-rates-state.pdf</u>).






Fall to Fall Retention Rates -- 1 Year Full-time, First-time, Degree-Seeking Freshmen






Persistence Rates (Semester to Semester) Full-time, First-time, Degree-Seeking Freshmen
